Dr. Pankaj Chakraborty

"Prospects for Peace and Conflict in South Asia"

Dr. Pankaj Chakraborty is Coordinator (Academics) and Head of the Department of Political Science, Holy Cross College, Durjoynagar, Agartala, India, and Fulbright Scholar—in—Residence, 2015-2016 at King's College in Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania. His research is in the areas of in political theory, Indian and western political thought, public administration, and human rights. His doctoral thesis was titled, "Decentralization, Panchayat Samiti and Development Planning: A Case Study of Tripura." In addition to his teaching and mentoring efforts, Mr. Chakraborty has a long and distinguished record of scholarship. He has edited three books and published several articles in various journals and edited collections. Chakraborty has served as a visiting faculty member at Tripura University and Sonamura Government Degree College, and an Academic Counselor at Indira Gandhi National Open University.

As part of the Fulbright Scholars—in—Residence at King's College, Wilkes-Barre, PA, Mr. Chakraborty teaches two classes per semester. In the Fall 2015 semester, he team-taught Post-Colonialism and the Nation-State, creating a new course for the college. During the Spring 2016 semester, Mr. Chakraborty is team-teaching The Politics of the United Nations. This course will include a "Model UN" session at the United Nations in New York. During both semesters Mr. Chakraborty will teach a course for the college's global studies requirement, Globalization and the Future of Terrorism, taught from the perspective of South Asia. Mr. Chakraborty will also be an active participant in the history, political science, and sociology departments; core area responsibility team meetings; meetings of the study abroad advisory council; international studies program meetings; and campus wide meetings reviewing the college's core curriculum.
