INDIGENOUS RESPONSES TO SOUTH ASIA'S CLIMATE CRISES




Indigenous peoples in South Asia inhabit some of the most naturally diverse and ecologically vulnerable regions on Earth. The climate crises they face are existential threats to their communities' well-being and, in some instances, to their very survival. To counteract short-term thinking and the extractive approaches to development and social change favored by South Asian governments and other authorities, Dr. Michael Ogden argues that the Seventh Generation Principle must be adopted. Articulated originally by the Haudenosaunee Confederacy in North America, it views the future not as a horizon too distant to care much about but as "an ever-present garden to be cultivated by all for all times" (Sardar, 2010). To illustrate such an ethos in action, the lecture will feature clips from Indigenous documentaries produced in South Asia that showcase the importance of thinking futuristically at the local level and of contemporary, place-based solutions to the climate crisis.

Ogden is an accomplished teacher, scholar, filmmaker and storyteller. A descendant of the Nez Perce and Salish people, he was raised on a cattle ranch in Oregon. Following his graduation with a B.A. in Communication Studies from George Fox University, he served as a Peace Corps volunteer in Fiji for two years. He subsequently earned a Ph.D. in political science at the University of Hawai'i. His academic career includes an instructor position at the Center for Pacific Studies and tenured appointments at the University of Hawai'i, Central Washington University, where he taught in the American Indian Studies Program and founded a film studies program, and Zayed University in Dubai. He retired from Zayed last fall, having taught multiple media-related courses, including filmmaking, and served as dean of the university's College of Humanities and Social Sciences.

***“The Narrative Power: Mapping South Asian Think Tanks
and Their Influence on Policy Formulation”***



Abstract: The mapping of contemporary South Asian think tanks reveals a growing diversity in their operating models, with newer, frequently non-governmental organizations prioritizing social justice, environmental sustainability, and regional integration. These think tanks offer alternative policy narratives, with impact relying less on direct bureaucratic links and more on their capacity to mobilize civil society, foster cross-border dialogues, and introduce novel conceptual frameworks that challenge dominant government thinking. By cultivating robust stakeholder relationships, producing accessible “impact stories,” and engaging with media and emerging scholars, they strive to circumvent traditional gatekeepers. Ultimately, their policy influence is a function of not only the content (the research) but also the manner (the narrative presentation), determining whether their ideas are perceived as politically inconvenient or embraced as the new consensus for regional stability and progress.

Dr. Taimur Shamil is a national security and foreign policy expert from Pakistan, based in New York, U.S. He holds a Ph.D. in International Relations with over 15 years of service in government, academia and media. Mr. Shamil is the former Show Host of prime-time program “Dialogue with Taimur Shamil” on Pakistan Television, PTV (World), where he focused on Pakistan’s foreign policy and global politics. His analyses have also appeared regularly on national and international TV Channels like Al-Jazeera, Al-Jazeera Arabic and several other TV channels. Mr. Shamil has served as Senior Research Fellow at Pakistan’s leading think tank, the Islamabad Policy Research Institute (IPRI), and adjunct faculty at the National Defence University. He is the President and Executive Director of Policy East, a New York based think tank.
